Science

Go outdoors and see how many minibeasts you can find! Think about their habitat. Why do they like living there? What is there for them to eat? How do they get shelter? You could:

- Make a tally chart of the minibeasts that you find
- Sketch them
- Research them to find out interesting facts
- Make a poster about your favourite minibeast
- Write an information text about minibeasts



Geography



Mrs Edgar's video challenge for this week is on our website. She is challenging the children to guess which country she is talking about then find it on a world map. We would then like your child to draw their own world map and label the 7 continents and 5 main oceans. They can do this on Purple Mash or on paper and then upload the photo to the Geography blog.

History

Make a time capsule! This is a fun way to record your memories and it will give you something to look back on in years to come.



You could include:

- Some pictures/photos of the time you're spending at home
 - Newspaper clippings
 - The diary you have been writing (or start one now!)
 - Any artwork you have created

DT

Use Lego or any other construction kit to make a UK landmark. Add a photo to the Woodhouse Teacher blog and see if we can guess what it is.



PSHCE/Online Blog

Create a 'Wish Jar'. Find an empty jar or pot. Every time anyone in your family says "I wish we could..." but you can't because of lockdown then write that wish on a piece of paper and put it into the Wish Jar. When lockdown ends, you can empty the jar and see how many of the things you can do.



Art

Music

Do some research! Ask your grown ups (or ring up family members) to find out about the singer/musician they enjoyed listening to when they were younger.



Find out:

- How did your grown up listen to music?
- Have any of their songs been rerecorded by modern artists?
- Have a listen - do you like it? Review it!

French



Can you learn to count to 10 using

Parents can read a number in French and the child stands if it is even and sits if it is odd. They get a point every time they get it right, lose a point every time they get it wrong.

Then swap and your child reads the number and see who gets the most points.

If your child can already count to 10 in French, challenge them to go to 20:

They could also make up their own counting in French song to help them remember!

PE

Outside: We usually start practising our athletics skills at this time of year but don't worry! You can still do this at home.

Target throw - make hoops out of string/skipping ropes/scarves and make up a simple score system. Throw balls/beanbags/pairs of socks!

Obstacle race - create an obstacle race! Keep safe and make sure there is a grown up around. Use this picture for inspiration. →



Inside: Choose a move and see how many you can complete in 30 seconds - can you improve your score each day? Who is the champion in your household? Ideas for moves: burpee, squat, jumping jack, star jump, high knees.

Reading

Perform a poem!

Find a poem that you really enjoy reading and learn it off by heart. You could add actions and sound effects. Make sure you read fluently and with expression. Perform it to your family. You could even perform it to family and friends on a video call. Keep an eye out on the website - the teachers will be having a go!



Writing

Keep your diaries going. Use a pen and paper (or pencil!) It's really important that you keep writing as well as typing.

What are you looking forward to?


