World War 2 is a significant part of our history in the UK, just as this period of Lockdown will be for us and the rest of the world in years to come.



Mrs Cripwell has been busy baking with her daughter, Lucy. She wanted to make something with an easy to follow recipe that you will hopefully already have the ingredients for. Flapjack has been around since the 16th century and it's a food that is still very popular in the UK. The golden syrup that is often used in flapjack was first produced by Abram Lyle in an East London factory in 1881. It was originally called 'Goldie'.

From the Lyle's website:

'During the six years Britain was at war, from 1939 to 1945, Lyle's was more than just a factory. It was a community, a place of support and an integral part of the East End of London. During those difficult times, it provided jobs to women, food for soldiers, protection and shelter for the local population.'


PE

Maths

Create your own Maths game to help practise number bonds or your times tables. How many can you get right in 1 minute? Can you improve your score and your time each day? There are some examples from each year group for you to download if you need. In school these are known as probes, zingers or matrices. They are basically grids which help children to practise recalling important number facts. Children start learning their 2 times table in Y1 and should know all of the times tables up to 12x by the end Y4. This includes knowing the division facts too e.g. 18 divided by 2 = 9.

Planned Play

We have added this section for children in Reception and Y1 who may need to do more of their learning through play-based activities. However, children of any age may enjoy them too!

This week, for planned play you will need:

- A selection of coins
- Some shopping items
Such as: empty cereal boxes, empty food containers, empty shampoo bottles etc
- A notepad and pencil
- Stickers or paper and sticky tape
- A cardboard box/shoe box
- Cuddly toy 'shoppers'

The set up:

Set up a mini shop. Make labels for the items in the shop. Keep the prices the same as the coins to start with until your child can recognise all of the coins, then change the prices so that they have to add 1ps and 2ps together. Teach them to tap the 2p coin twice when they count it.

Use the notepad to make shopping lists - if your child is not able to write the words they could draw a little picture instead or copy the word from the box or container.

Use the cardboard box or shoe box to make a pretend till.

Add other little boxes inside so they can sort the coins.

Each morning you could pretend there has been a new delivery and add different items to the shop.

Encourage your child to do a 'stock take' and make a list of the new items and add price labels to them.

Additional ideas to keep the play going:

- The shop could change every few days - supermarket to toy shop to flower shop (complete with homemade flowers)
- Play 'I Spy' with the items in the shop or hide an item and your child has to guess which one has gone missing.
- Choose a letter and your child has to fill the shop with items that begin with that sound
e.g. banana, ball, brick, baby, bag, biscuits
- 'Friday Flash Sales' - on Friday everything in the shop has to be reduced by 1p!
Can they work out the new prices?
- Sometimes, their toys might want to do some shopping and may have a list of items that they need to buy.
Can the shopkeepers collect the items for their toys and tell them what their bill is?
- Can your child find something from around your house that could be used as a pretend scanner?
- Can they add a + and = sign to their till?
