


Woodhouse - Home Learning Week 11: 22.06.20

Planned Play

We have added this section for children in Reception and Y1 who may need to do more of their learning through play-based activities. However, children of any age may enjoy them too!

This week's Planned Play is all about picnics! Listen to Mrs Hirst read 'The is the Bear and the Picnic Lunch' by Sarah Hayes and Helen Craig.

You will need:

- A rug or blanket
- Plates and cups
- Snacks
- An assortment of toys to join in

The set up:

- Set up an area for your picnic with the rug or blanket, encourage your child to choose toys to join them for the picnic and help to prepare the snacks
- Your child could be the waiter/waitress and serve the snacks to the toys

Additional ideas to keep the play going:

- Help your child to design a meal for each toy by drawing a circle onto a piece of paper and drawing the food their toy would want to eat on the circle plate
- Your child could make a list of orders for each toy which would help them to practise writing words or write a picnic café menu
- Practise finding fractions by drawing circle plates, cutting them out and folding them in half and then into quarters. Choose a different food item to draw in each quarter. Explain to your child that a half is 1 part out of 2 and a quarter is 1 part out of 4.
