

In English this week, we wrote sentences to retell the story 'The Great Flood' by Terry Deary. We used a range of conjunctions to extend our sentences and to add more detail. We also used expanded noun phrases in our sentences and particularly focused on ensuring that the adjectives we chose were appropriate for the noun. E.G. 'The ginormous, destructive flood' instead of 'The wet, blue flood'.

In Maths, we have been using the column subtraction method with exchanging. We began by looking at questions where the exchanging happens in the ones column and then moved on to exchanging in the tens. After this, we looked at questions which include a 'tricky zero'. We will continue to consolidate this method in our future Maths lessons.
