In English this week, we have continued our narrative writing based on the story 'The Eagle Who Thought He Was A Chicken'. We have focused on the problem in the story and looked at the main characters' thoughts and feelings at this moment.

We are continuing to remind children about the structure of a simple, high 5 sentence. We are using the below phrase to embed the use of capital letters and full stops.

Sentences start with a capital letter and finish with a full stop.

Children are also being challenged to extend their sentences with conjunctions (and, but, so, because) and are using these to add extra information to a simple sentence, to make it more interesting for the reader.

Eaglet was feeling sad.
Eaglet was feeling sad because Owl said he was not a chicken.

In Maths, we have drawn together all our knowledge about addition and subtraction to write families of number sentences that go together. We learnt that in an addition number sentence, the largest number is always the answer. In subtraction number sentences, the largest number is always the number we subtract from.
